Allen Clayton Cash was born September 19, 1935, in Hoffman, Oklahoma, to Wilbur Lee and Mae Elizabeth Howell Cash. He died Friday, April 17, 2020, in Collinsville, Oklahoma, at the age of 84 years. Allen completed his secondary education then served his country honorably with the United States Navy in the submarine service. He was married December 28, 1961, in Collinsville to Joyce Kaemper. They have made their home in Collinsville since that time. Allen began his working career with McDonnell Douglas Aircraft in Tulsa as an assembler. He then spent over 32 years as a radiology supervisor with Yuba Heat Transfer. He was a member and past chairman of the American Society for Nondestructive Testing. 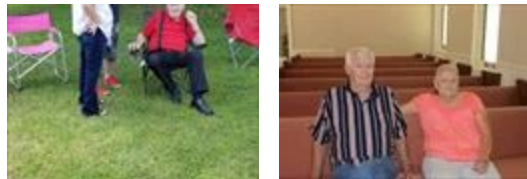
