Once she had her driver's license, she also had turns at her dad's Thunderbird, driving around the square and along Lincoln Avenue on weekend nights, taking me to Ashmore to visit her Mamaw and Papaw, taking me with her to pick up Nancy after her shift at Burger Queen so that we could spend a late-night conversation together. She encouraged me to try out for Trojets, where she was a leader--and she held the leads in musicals with a strong voice and even stronger stage presence.

The summer after her first year at Mizzou, she drove me to Columbia, MO, so that I could meet her Gary and help set up their first apartment. Though she had always been wonderful at finding joy in all kinds of occasions, she was so fully happy at the prospect of the rest of her life--a life with a man she loved and trusted, with a future of children with whom she would share joys, too--and friends because she was one of the best at friendship.

It is easy to imagine her greeting old friends and dear loved ones now, granting them her beautiful smile and finding with them all the ways to enjoy the next life.
